

## COMPLEX COMPOUND SENTENCES:

**Complex Compound Sentences** are sentences made from two or more independent clauses and one or more dependent clauses.

**Example:**

*Although I like to go camping, I haven't had the time to go lately, and I haven't found anyone to go with.*

*Although I like to go camping* is the sentence's dependent clause.

*I haven't had time to go lately* is the sentence's first independent clause.

*I haven't found anyone to go with* is the sentence's second independent clause.

- An *independent clause* (or *main clause*) is a clause that can stand by itself, also known as a simple sentence. An independent clause contains a subject and a predicate; it makes sense by itself.
- A dependent clause (also subordinate clause) cannot stand alone as a sentence. A dependent clause is usually attached to an independent clause. Although a dependent clause contains a subject and a predicate, it sounds incomplete when standing alone
