- In describing individual bride and groom, what are the first few adjectives that streams into your mind?
- **Groom's state prior to the meeting of his bride and how much has he changed after meeting her?**
- How did they meet each other?
- **How were you told about the bride by the groom?**
- If you happen to be a married person, then how would you give some marriage tips and advice to the couple?
- **Can you relate to any special event or anecdotes to illustrate either the groom or the bride?**
- Go through sample wedding toasts and jot down few simple ones, just in case that is!
- **After writing and answering all, you have to utilize them into some entertaining yet heartfelt toasts.**

Condense

Later in this book, we'll talk about the actual format of your BMS, but for now you need to know that having a time limit in mind is best when writing.

Most wedding guests are more interested in the food, the fun and the champagne than they are for your speech. It can be fun, but keep it concise.

Write Early

A majority of weddings only happen after months of planning. This gives you ample time to write and perfect your speech... meaning write it early on!

Seriously, don't wait. Procrastination leaves you no time to format, correct or edit your speech. Some guys try to wing it, and most end up fumbling their way through. Write it weeks in advance (if possible or ASAP) leave it for a day, then read it again. Make corrections, and again condense.
