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I. Overview

The BettertonCollegePlanner.com college-planning tool (“BCP”) is the most accurate, detailed, and comprehensive college-planning tool available. BCP was created in conjunction with a team of experts led by former admission and financial aid personnel at Princeton University.

Compared to other college-planning tools, BCP is “Best in Class,” offering a great deal of added value for your business. BCP can be divided into two major areas: admissions and cost & aid. This aspect alone—combining an admission evaluation tool with complete “how to pay” information—separates BCP from other college-planning tools. But that’s not all. Within each major area, BCP reaches a level of detail and accuracy that is unique in the college-planning field.

The typical admission prediction model uses GPA and SAT/ACT scores to sort the student’s chances into *safety*, *match*, and *reach* categories. This is far too simplistic a method to offer much help to a student trying to organize a realistic college list, let alone to offer the student guidance on how to improve his/her chances of admission. BCP takes a different approach. BCP’s method mirrors the way college admission committees evaluate applicants and decide which ones to admit. To do this effectively, BCP’s Fit & Match admission algorithm uses, not two or three, but up to 20 academic and personal variables, including five “tags,” or special attributes, that give applicants extra consideration in the process.

The proprietary algorithm used by BCP to run Fit & Match has been tested for validity using 4,600 students who applied to more than 27,000 colleges over a two-year period, and Betterton College Planning stands committed to annual testing and updating.

The Cost & Aid section operates with a similar level of detail and specificity. In addition to a careful explanation of how to figure the cost of a college, BCP’s Cost & Aid section offers detailed information on a college’s merit scholarships, an estimate of a family’s eligibility for need-based aid that takes into account college aid policies, and a full description of state aid programs.

But BCP does not limit its admission and financial planning to students ready to apply to college. Students in any high school grade can take advantage of the benefits of BCP. There are four student programs:

- **Peak Period** - recommended for students in spring of 11th grade through high school graduation;
- **Prep & Planning** - recommended for students in spring of 10th grade through fall of 11th grade;
- **Getting Started** - recommended for students in spring of 9th grade through fall of 10th grade; and
- **Looking Ahead** - recommended for students in spring of 8th grade through fall of 9th grade.

All of us at Betterton College Planning are confident that BCP will help you grow your college-planning business as you accurately and efficiently help families navigate the complex, high-stakes journey to finding the right college.

I. Student Interface

A. As set forth above, BCP has four different entry points, or programs. The appropriate entry point depends on the student's current grade and semester. As the programs progress from Looking Ahead to Peak Period, more and more information is collected and evaluated, making both the admission and aid results increasingly accurate. For the purpose of this guide, we are going to illustrate the Peak Period Program (spring 11th grade through high school graduation). The three earlier entry points are essentially age-appropriate versions of the Peak Period Program. (For example, the Looking Ahead Program does not ask the student to input SAT scores, because most students don't take their first SAT until the spring of 11th grade. While asking for SAT scores in the Looking Ahead Program might accommodate the truly advanced student, doing so would risk creating anxiety for the typical 9th grade student who may know nothing about the SAT.) Once you are thoroughly familiar with Peak Period Program, take your own tour of Looking Ahead, Getting Started, and Prep & Planning so you can see the differences in content, inputs, and outputs.

Note: You can move a student from one program to the next one at any time during the student's one-year subscription period. For example, if you engage an 11th grade student in October, you can start him off in Prep & Planning and switch him to Peak Period in January.

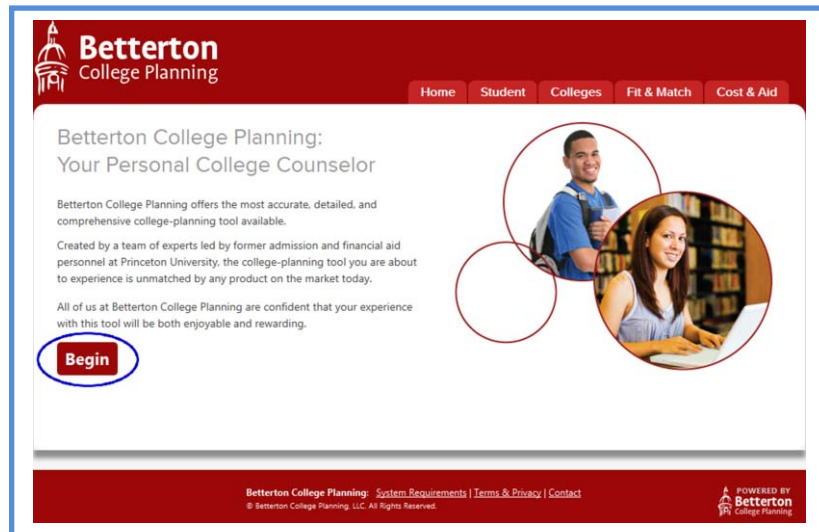

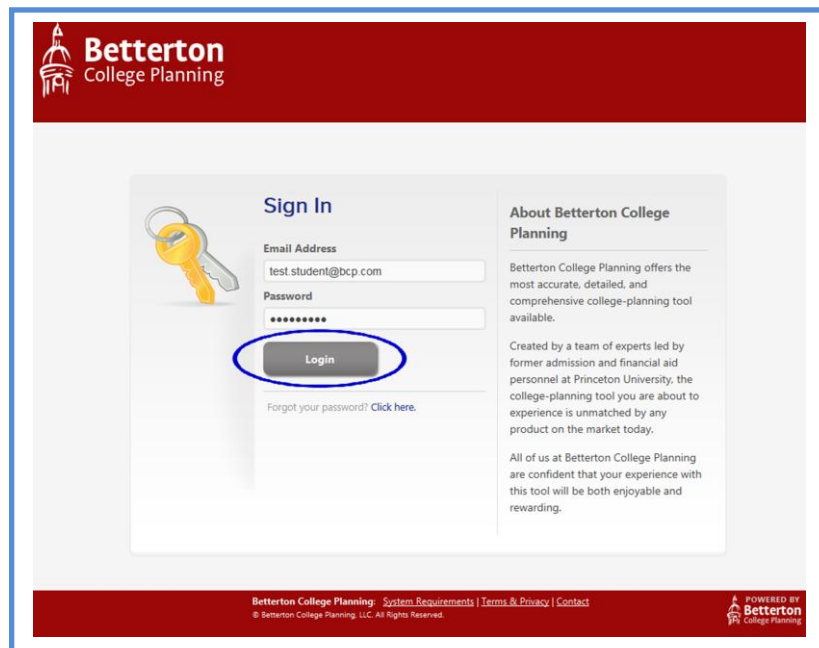
We recommend you have the student begin in the year that matches up with her place in high school because the inputs reflect what can be expected of a typical student in the same grade and the results and other feedback are appropriately classified. You are, however, free to use BCP as you please.

i. Logging In

Students can log in to their BCP accounts by visiting www.bettertoncollegeplanner.com and clicking the **Begin** button.



Students then enter an email address and password, before clicking the **Login** button.



ii. Home

BCP's Home page provides a roadmap of the program. In short: students complete their profiles in the **Student** section; enter and search for colleges of interest in the **Colleges** section; and review results in the **Fit & Match** and **List Balance** sections. (Please note that the List Balance feature is part of the main Fit & Match feature.) Families can check on college merit scholarships and complete an aid form to get an estimate of their bottom-line cost of attendance in the **Cost & Aid** section. They are also welcome to explore a section devoted exclusively to state aid programs.

The **Set Up** page appears first. It is intended to collect information that you, the Advisor, may find useful in communicating with, and otherwise serving, your client. All of the set up information entered by the student is available to you through your administrative account.

Background – Basic Data

The **Background - Basic Data** page is the first page that collects data that will be used to run the Fit & Match admission algorithm. More specifically, responses to the questions that ask about ethnicity, whether the student had to deal with personal obstacles while in high school, and whether the student's parents attended college could result in "tags" that are factored in to the Fit & Match algorithm. Additionally, information regarding the student's state of residence is used to show the student the aid programs in his state, as well as to calculate in-state tuition when appropriate.

Academics

The **Student Profile** now starts to collect academic data beginning with GPA and class rank. The pages on **GPA & Class Rank** and **Courses & Level** are known as the “transcript pages.” These pages collect the information that is generally considered to be the most important part of an admission application.

- **GPA & Class Rank**

We ask for unweighted GPA (up to a maximum of 4.0) because high schools vary widely in their policies on how many points they add to student grades for honors or AP courses. The BCP algorithm “weighs” the GPA in a uniform way by looking at the overall strength of the student’s academic program. When available, class rank (entered as a specific number or decile) is a helpful additional piece of academic information. But since the recent trend has been for fewer and fewer schools to rank, the student’s academic rating can be calculated without class rank.

The practice among college admission offices is to discount to some extent the grades received in non-academic electives like a health or home economics class and to look more closely at how the student performs in the core courses. - Standardized Tests

We now get to one of the more controversial parts of the academic profile: the college admission tests. The first three—EXPLORE, PLAN, and PSAT/NMSQT—are practice tests that are not used in admissions. The PSAT, however, can be considered more important than the others because a high 11th grade PSAT score may qualify the student for recognition through the National Merit Scholarship Program.

As for the SAT and ACT, students usually concentrate their preparation efforts on the test on which they feel they can get the higher score. Virtually all colleges accept scores from either test, but many require students who submit ACT scores to also submit a score for the Optional Writing Test. Many of the more competitive colleges also require scores from two SAT Subject tests.

Activities Plus

The **Student Profile** continues by collecting information on what the student does outside of the classroom. While it is safe to say that the academic component is weighted more heavily by admission offices, the student's involvement, performance, and contributions in various activities can have a major positive (or unfortunately in some cases, negative) effect on his chances of admission.

- School Activities

Once an admission staff has looked over a student's transcript and test scores, it usually considers what the student has accomplished through school activities. In this particular category, we are asking the student about participation in group activities at school—how many, how important, and how significant a role does the student play. The **View examples** and the **Help Me Decide** pop-up menus offer the student guidance on which of the descriptions to choose. The student may also indicate that she has held the top leadership position in one or more school activities.

Another important part of this category is the statement at the bottom of the page: *I am unable to participate due to other commitments*. This is a “level the playing field” question that most admission offices ask in order to make sure that students who fail to participate for good reasons are not penalized. (This “unable to participate” input field is also included in the Outside of School Activities category.)



- Talent

While both School Activities (see above) and Outside Activities (see below) collect information on participation and accomplishments in group activities, the Talent page collects information on individual ability or talent. Talent can be demonstrated in many areas, including the ones listed as examples. The **Help Me Decide** pop-up menu offers the student guidance on which of the descriptions to choose. Of the five personal profile categories that are included in BCP (School Activities, Talent, Outside Activities, Volunteerism, and Character Traits), a very strong talent in an area that is recognized as important by a college can have the most significant impact on the admission decision.

- Outside Activities (aka “Outside of School Activities”)

For students whose most significant accomplishments occur apart from organized school activities, this part of the personal profile is quite important. For example, getting very involved in scouting, particularly reaching high levels such as Eagle Scout or Girl Scout Gold says a lot about a student’s ability and commitment. The same can be said of time spent, and contributions made, in various religious activities. Note also that working for pay is included here as an activity that is valued by admission offices. Because holding down a job is not as common as it once was, doing so is a plus in the admission process, especially if the student has demonstrated a strong work ethic over time and has achieved increasing levels of responsibility.

In fact, most admission offices scrutinize this category and give considerable credit to those who are committed to a cause over time (not just a Saturday at the soup kitchen in the summer before senior year) and make a level of contribution that significantly improves the lives of more than a few people.

iv. Colleges

The **Colleges**, or **Select Colleges**, section allows the student to enter colleges by name or search for colleges by various attributes. By the time a student reaches the Prep & Planning or Peak Period programs, he should have at least a few colleges in mind, and it is likely that the parents will have more to add. Generally, it is best to begin by typing the names of those colleges into the **Enter College Name** field. Hopefully, there will be enough commonality among the known colleges to help establish the parameters for using the **Find Colleges** feature (in the left column) to expand the students lists, if necessary. When using the **Enter College Name** feature, have the student pay attention to the official name of the college. Is it University of _____ or _____ University? Is it _____ College or College of _____? To make matters even more confusing, there are some college names that start with "The." If at first you don't succeed, keep trying—just about every 4-year college in the United States is in our database.

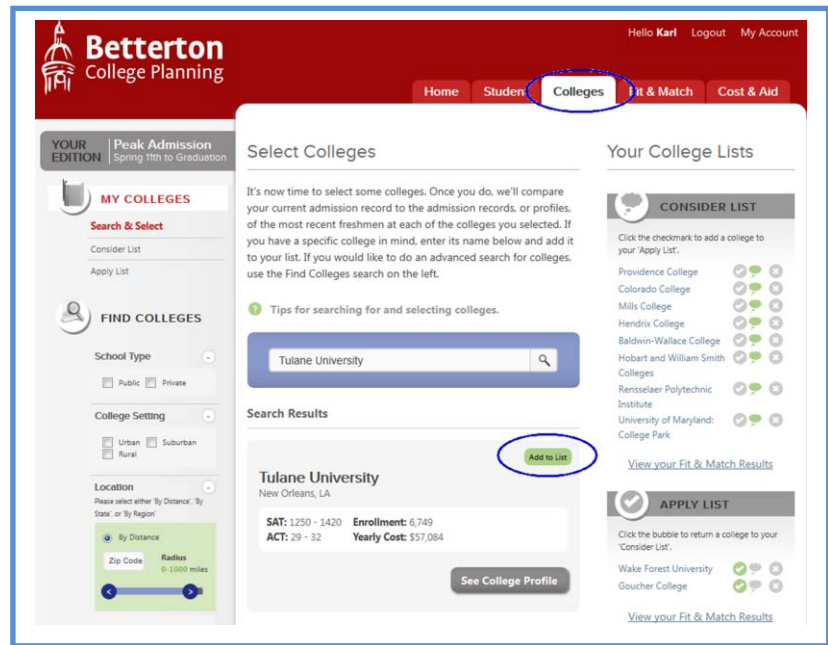

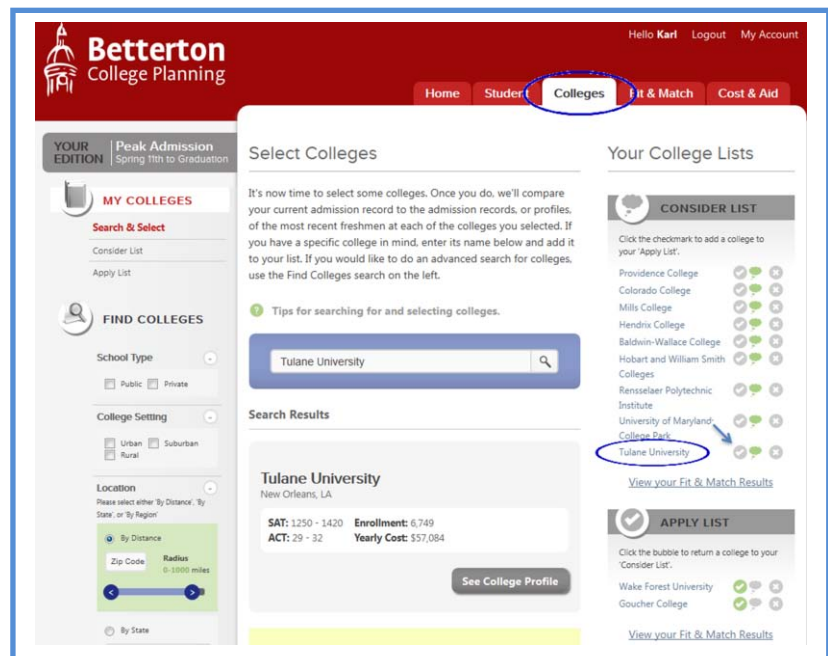

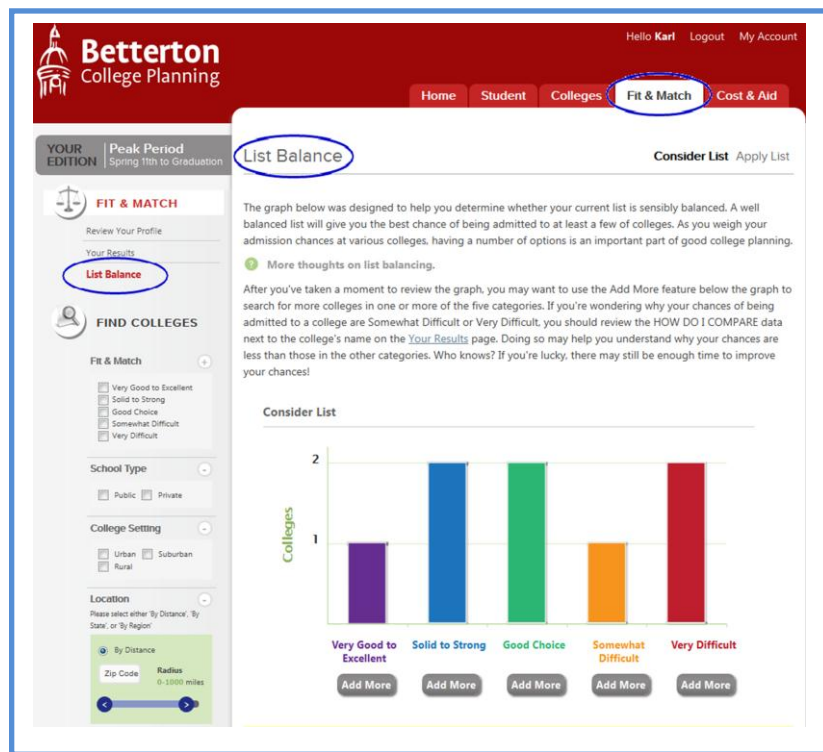

Next Steps

It's a good idea to have a "balanced" college list. Sometimes this means adding a college or two to a specific college-search result category. To better determine whether your current college list is balanced, select the List Balance button now!

List Balance

By clicking on the **List Balance** button, the student is taken to the List Balance page, which features a bar graph that is intended to help the student determine whether she has a well-balanced list.



A well-balanced list will give the student the best chance of being admitted to at least a few of the colleges on her Apply List. But coming up with a realistic college list is easier said than done. **Nowadays, many colleges run aggressive marketing campaigns to increase the size of their applicant pool. Colleges have been known to send hundreds of “we want you” letters for every one student who is eventually admitted. These mailings create false expectations on the part of the student as to her chances of admission.** The result is often a list that is “overloaded” with colleges in the Somewhat Difficult and Very Difficult categories. Although it is okay to have some “reach” colleges, it is important to balance the list with colleges in some of the other categories.

To help remedy this situation, we have developed the **Add More** feature. This tool enables the student to expand the Apply List or Consider List by adding colleges in a particular admission category, or “bucket.” While the student is free to click on the **Add More** button in any of the categories, students with too many reach colleges should be encouraged to add colleges in categories that represent a better chance of being admitted. **In using BCP as an advisor, your goal should be to do what is reasonably necessary to ensure that the student ultimately has a well-balanced Apply List, and, with the help of the Cost & Aid section, to give the family good information regarding the likely real cost of attendance.**

Cost & Aid begins with a general introduction and some sound advice: college financial planning should NOT be delayed until admission planning is in its final stages. Financial planning should be done in conjunction with admission planning. The unfortunate result of putting off "How are we going to pay?" questions is that some parents discover that the first-choice colleges of their children are not affordable and it is too late to submit other applications. BCP was designed to help avoid such an occurrence by giving you, the advisor, and the family the resources necessary to work on admission and financial planning simultaneously.

After reviewing the introduction, you should select the **Cost Components** and **Financial Aid Opportunities** buttons and carefully read the content. Once that is done, you will likely know more about these two areas than your clients. You can then share this knowledge with them before moving on to the merit and need sections.

Next, you can decide how you would like to proceed through the vast amount of aid information that is provided by BCP. We suggest that you start with **Merit Aid** because it is relatively straightforward and doesn't require completion of the Aid Form.

Your College Merit Scholarships

Merit scholarships are based on student characteristics, achievement, or talent and are usually independent of a family's financial situation. It is always a good idea to check into a college's merit scholarships as the amount of the award is a dollar for dollar reduction in college costs. This is true even if you plan to apply for financial aid. Renewing your merit scholarship each year may require a minimum GPA as well as meeting other standards.

In the 2010-2011 academic year Hobart and William Smith Colleges awarded **\$7,512,309** in merit scholarships to its undergraduates.

The column entitled **Estimated Real Cost Range** displays estimates of the family's real annual cost of attendance at the colleges on the student's list. In your role as counselor, you may want to highlight that sometimes colleges with high published Yearly Costs (Tulane – Yearly Cost \$60,224; Estimated Real Cost Range \$15,201-\$18,701) may actually cost less to attend than colleges with lower published Yearly Costs (Hobart and William Smith Colleges – Yearly Cost \$58,412; Estimated Real Cost Range \$30,419-\$33,919). The main reason for this apparent anomaly is that some colleges meet a higher percent of student need than others.

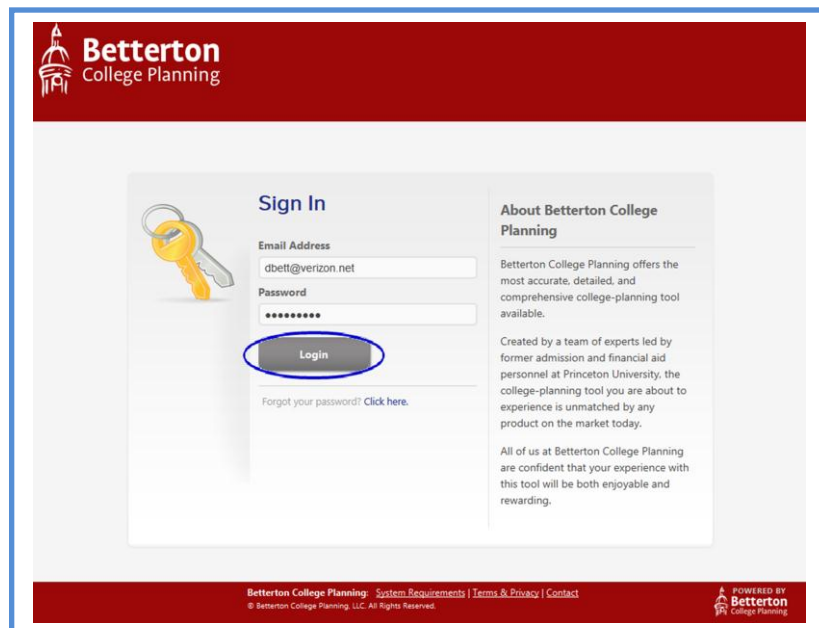




