2 APPLY FOR FINANCIAL AID AND SCHOLARSHIPS (if applicable)

3 SUBMIT PREVIOUS COLLEGE TRANSCRIPTS (if applicable)

CCC Degree/Certificate Seeking: If you are transferring to CCC from a regionally-accredited U.S. institution, or if you have AP, CLEP, IB or DSST scores, submit your official transcripts to Graduation Services. **Non-Degree/ Certificate Seeking:** If a course requisite waiver is needed, submit unofficial transcripts to Advising & Career Services. 4 DETERMINE PLACEMENT

Money, registration and myClackamas— what you need to know!

College Services Fee

A non-refundable \$28 per term fee will be applied to students taking credit courses. The College Services Fee covers the cost of various services including graduation, parking, a shuttle, testing and transcripts. The fee is applied at the time of registration for students registering for one or more credits.

Refunds

If you stop going to class and you don't officially drop the classes from your schedule, you will be held academically and financially responsible.

myClackamas

myClackamas is your portal to all things CCC. This secure site allows you to check your CCC assigned email, register and pay for classes, access financial aid documents and more.

After you are admitted to CCC, an email with your new CCC student email address and instructions for logging into myClackamas will be sent to the secondary email account (gmail, yahoo, etc.) you provided on your admission application.

If you applied for admission and:

- don't know your CCC email address, go to myClackamas (<https://my.clackamas.edu>) and choose "Forgot your email address?"
- don't know your password, go to myClackamas (<https://my.clackamas.edu>) and choose "Forgot Password?" Follow the directions provided.

If you are a current CCC student and:

Registration

Registration is based on the number of completed credits at CCC (credits completed at other colleges are not counted for registration purposes). 2019-20 Changes:

- **In-state tuition:** Increase by \$3 resulting in a \$103 per credit rate.
- **Out-of-state tuition:** Increase by \$8 resulting in a \$274 per credit rate.

TUITION AND FEES

Tuition and fee rates are subject to change without prior notice.

In-state	\$103 per credit	Applies to U.S. citizens or immigrants with a residency status (90 days at that address prior to the start of the term) in Oregon, Idaho, California, Nevada and Washington.

Want your refund deposited directly into your bank account? Click on Payment Information in myClackamas then myProfile. Enter your bank account information. This includes financial aid and emergency loan checks.

How do I pay?

Pay Now: Payment is due at the time of registration. You can pay in person with cash or a local, bank-imprinted check, for the amount due. You can make credit card payments in person or online using Visa, MasterCard, Discover or American Express.

Pay Later*: Payment is due July 8. Accounts with a balance after this date will be charged a \$30 deferred payment fee.

Deferred Payment: Account balances must be paid by Aug. 5 or you will be charged a non-payment fee of \$75 and a hold will be put on your account that will prevent future registration.

*Pay Later Conditions: You must be 18 years of age, owe a balance of at least \$100, and cannot have an existing balance from a previous term or owe a financial aid repayment. If these conditions do not apply, payment is due at the time of registration.

How do I get a refund?

CCC provides full refunds if you drop your classes on time. We do not provide partial refunds. To receive a full refund YOU must drop your classes:

- During the first 2 weeks of the class for classes meeting 5 weeks or more
- During the first week of the class for classes meeting 3-4 weeks
- Before the class begins for classes meeting 2 weeks or less

Registration and important information *You need to know this!*

Very Important Registration Information

With college comes more choice, freedom and responsibility. Here are some highlights of important information for successful college students.

- **Avoid the \$50 late add fee!**
The late fee will be applied the fourth (4th) business day after the first official day of the class. So if your class starts on a Monday, you must be registered by the end of the business day on Thursday or you will be charged the late fee of \$50.00.
To avoid this fee, make sure you are registered for all of your courses in a timely manner.
 - Check your schedule on myClackamas both after you register and the first day of the term (your class location may have changed). If you want to add, drop, or change a class, be certain that you make these changes through myClackamas or Enrollment Services and that the changes are reflected on your schedule.
 - To receive a refund for a full-term course, be sure to drop it by the end of the second week. For classes that do not meet the entire term (e.g., weekend courses, short courses, etc.), it is important to refer to the refund schedule online at www.clackamas.edu or on the *Financial Matters* page in this *Schedule of Classes*.
 - **Avoid non-payment fees by making payments according to the payment plan policy.** (See preceding page for more information.)
- Be a more informed and successful student: Read the *Academic Regulations* after the course listings in this *Schedule of Classes*.
- Ask questions! If you are uncertain about something, ask your instructor or a staff member. They can help you get the answer.

Academic Calendar—Clackamas Community College operates on the quarter system. Each of our terms are eleven weeks in length with many courses being offered in a condensed and/or standard term format. Be sure to check the *Schedule of Classes* for individual class meeting times.

Corequisite—A corequisite is a second, related course in which a student must be simultaneously enrolled in addition to the primary course.

Course Prerequisites—Some CCC courses have prerequisite requirements. You will be required to meet these prior to enrolling.

Grades—Grade options generally include A, B, C, D, F, P/N (Pass, No Pass), or X (Audit). Be sure to select the grade option you want at the time of registration by selecting: Register Pass/Fail for P/N or Audit for all classes you wish to audit.

Registration and Transcript Holds—Students who have not met their financial obligations to the college may have restrictions placed on their ability to register for future terms and/or have official transcripts released.

Ordering Transcripts—Official transcripts (record of your classes, grades earned and degrees awarded) are available upon request. Unofficial transcripts are available via myClackamas. Order transcripts online via www.parchment.com. For more information call our transcript request line at 503-594-6074.

Student Rights & Responsibilities—When you enroll at Clackamas Community College you assume certain rights and responsibilities as a student that relate to your educational record, academic performance and individual conduct. These are stated in the Student Handbook—www.clackamas.edu/documents/handbook.pdf

Student Photo ID Cards—Cards are available at an Enrollment Services Center and are necessary for library checkout, access to computer/tutorial labs and admission to college events. Picture ID and current enrollment are required. There is a \$10 replacement fee for stolen or lost ID cards.

Nursing

The Nursing program at Clackamas Community College is a full partner in the Oregon Consortium for Nursing Education (OCNE). The curriculum in OCNE nursing programs is a competency-based curriculum developed in collaboration with Oregon Health & Science University (OHSU) and other community colleges around the state. This curriculum, which has been approved by the Oregon State Board of Education as well as the Oregon State Board of Nursing, can ultimately culminate in a Baccalaureate of Science Degree with a focus in Nursing on the community college campus offered by OHSU.

Admission into the nursing program is by special application only. Acceptance to the nursing program allows for co-enrollment to Clackamas Community College and Oregon Health & Science University, School of Nursing.

The Nursing Assistant course, while not required to enter the Nursing program, provides a strong foundation regarding the delivery of care to clients in various settings.

Absences/Attendance

- You must be officially registered to attend class.

Academic Standing

If you are a degree/certificate student taking 6 or more credits, you are required to maintain a 2.0 GPA and complete at least 50% of your attempted credits in order to remain in good academic standing.

Active Military Duty

If you are called up for active military duty, and wish to withdraw from classes, you will be held harmless with as much as possible regard to financial and academic responsibility.

- You will be asked to officially withdraw from classes by web, fax, mail, or in person.
- Students who have already shipped out or are unable to drop classes should contact Enrollment Services: 503-594-6074 or registrar@clackamas.edu.
- You will be asked to submit a copy of your orders along with a request for a refund/credit to Enrollment Services.

Adding and Dropping Classes

- You are required to obtain instructor permission (signature) once classes begin.
- You must officially drop courses you have registered for if you decide to stop going to class. **Ceasing to attend class does not constitute official withdrawal! You will be held responsible academically and financially if you do not officially drop your courses. Official withdrawal is via myClackamas or in person.**

FERPA

Administrative Withdraw

- If you don't attend your class during the first two weeks of the class, instructors **MAY** drop you but **ARE NOT REQUIRED** to do so. This is called administrative withdrawal.
- If an instructor does an administrative withdrawal, you may be granted a full refund of charges for the class.
- An instructor may administratively withdraw you from a course if you are unable to demonstrate fulfillment of the stated class prerequisite or co-requisite requirement.
- If you are utilizing Financial Aid or Veteran's benefits, you may owe a repayment. Please check with these offices for additional information regarding your enrollment status and entitlement to benefits.
- If you are administratively withdrawn from a course, you will be notified by Enrollment Services.

Audit

An audit allows you to attend class without responsibility for a grade. Audit carries no credit, doesn't contribute toward full-time status and does not meet full-time status required for Veterans, Social Security, Financial Aid or athletic eligibility. All other college policies apply including registration, tuition payment, refunds, and attendance. If you decide to change your status from audit to credit or credit to audit, notify your instructor prior to the end of the sixth week of the term.

If you are a financial aid student, please notify the Financial Aid Office if you change from a credit to an audit or receive an audit grade. You may be required to pay back funds. Audit classes do not qualify for financial aid.

Variable Credit

Some courses are eligible for variable credit. These courses are noted in the Schedule of Classes with a "V" in the credit column. This option allows you to pursue an individualized learning program. You must register for the number of credits you expect to earn in that term as determined with your instructor. Changes to variable credit must be processed through registration by the end of the 10th week of the term.

Wait List

Some CCC classes utilize a wait list option. If the class you want to register for is full and it has a wait list:

- Add your name to the wait list via myClackamas or in person.
- When a spot opens up, you will receive an email in your @student.clackamas.edu email. You will have 48 hours to respond to the email.
- To add the class, go to "Manage my wait list" within myClackmas to register.
- You are responsible academically and financially if you no longer want to be in the class and don't drop it.

The following conditions may affect your eligibility for wait list placement:

- Wait list capacity has been met.
- There is a "hold" on your student record that restricts registration.
- There are course restrictions in place such as "instructor consent."
- You are already enrolled in another section of the same course.
- There is a time conflict with the course you have selected.
- You have reached the maximum number of credits allowed (18) without additional authorization.
- Class has already begun.




Enrollment Breakdown by Student Program 2017-2018

Cougars wrestlers tops in nation

Clackamas wrestling is known throughout the Northwest and from coast to coast for producing high-caliber wrestlers and students. On March 2, the Clackamas Community College wrestling team won the National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) National Championship. This is the third national championship CCC has won.

The Cougars qualified wrestlers in all 10 weight classes to compete in the tournament. They put on an impressive performance winning with a school record nine All-Americans, including two national champions, two national runners

up, two third placers, two fifth placers and a seventh placer.

“This is a special group of young men who believed in a mission and knew their purpose. It is not very often that you get to work with guys who buy in, believe in what they are doing and achieve a common goal the way these guys did,” Wrestling Coach Josh Rhoden said.

Clackamas Community College also set a new national scoring record with 176.5 points and a 24.5-point margin of victory. Rhoden and his staff were awarded the title National Coach of the Year for their efforts.

In the last 13 years, the wrestling program has a dual meet record of 141-35-2 and produced 77 All-Americans, 24 National Finalists, 11 National Champions, as well as earned 92 Academic All-Americans. The Cougars have won six National Dual Meet Championships, including winning an NJCAA record five straight championships from 2014 to 2018.

Cougar wrestlers are bound by a tradition of excellence and hard work. It is this commitment that allows the team to be a contender year in and year out at national championships.
