The Oral Communication portion of the agenda is for members of the public to present items which are not listed on the agenda, but are under the subject matter jurisdiction of the Commission. Although no action may be taken, the Commission and staff will follow up, at an appropriate time, on those items needing response. Each speaker is limited to (3) three minutes. Time may be surrendered by deferring (1) one minute to another speaker, not to exceed a total of (8) eight minutes. The speaker wishing to defer time must be present when the item is heard. In order to be recognized and present an item, each speaker must complete and submit to the Recording Secretary a Request to Speak form prior to the beginning of the item being announced by the Chair (forms are available at the entrance to the meeting room). Speakers are taken in the order slips are submitted.

Items in Consent Calendar Section A have already been considered by the Commission at a previous meeting where the public was invited to comment, after which a decision was made. These items are not subject to public discussion at this meeting because the vote taken at the previous meeting was final. Resolutions concerning decisions made at previous meetings are for the purpose of memorializing the decision to assure the accuracy of the findings, the prior vote, and any conditions imposed.

Items in Consent Calendar Section B have not been discussed previously by the Commission. If discussion is desired, an item may be removed from the Consent Calendar for individual consideration. Commissioners may indicate a negative or abstaining vote on any individual item by so declaring prior to the vote on the motion to adopt the entire Consent Calendar. Items excluded from the Consent Calendar will be taken up by the Commission following the action on the Consent Calendar. The Commission first will take up the items for which public speaker requests have been submitted. Public speakers shall follow the rules as set forth under Oral Communication.



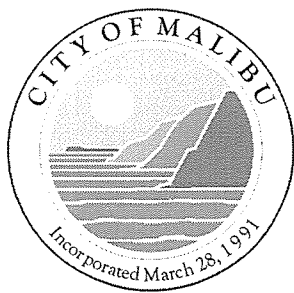
Items in New Business are items which are appearing for the first time for formal action. Public comment shall follow the rules as set forth under Oral Communication.



CALL TO ORDER

Vice Chair Frost called the meeting to order at 5:06 p.m.

ROLL CALL

The following persons were recorded in attendance by the Recording Secretary:

PRESENT: Vice Chair Chris Frost; and Commissioners Andy Cohen, Fred Roberts, Hans Laetz, and Tracy Wright

ALSO PRESENT: Rob DuBoux, Public Works Director; Susan Dueñas, Public Safety Manager; Arthur Aladjajian, Public Works Superintendent; Lieutenant Jennifer Seetoo and Deputy Mike Treinen, Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department; and Mary Linden, Executive Assistant

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Commissioner Laetz led the Pledge of Allegiance.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

MOTION Commissioner Roberts moved and Commissioner Cohen seconded a motion to approve the agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

REPORT ON POSTING OF AGENDA

Executive Assistant Linden reported that the agenda for the meeting was properly posted on January 29, 2019.

CEREMONIAL / PRESENTATIONS

A. Administration of Oath of Office to Newly Appointed Commissioner

Executive Assistant Linden administered the oath of office to Commissioner Laetz.

B. Election of Chair and Vice Chair

MOTION Commissioner Roberts nominated Chris Frost for Chair. Vice Chair Frost accepted the nomination.

MOTION Commissioner Wright nominated herself for Chair.

The question was called and Vice Chair Frost, Commissioner Roberts, Commissioner Cohen, and Commissioner Laetz voted for Chris Frost, and Commissioner Wright voted for herself. Chris Frost was elected Chair by a vote of 4-1.

MOTION Commissioner Laetz nominated Tracy Wright for Vice Chair. Commissioner Wright accepted the nomination.

MOTION Chair Frost nominated Andy Cohen for Vice Chair. Commissioner Cohen accepted the nomination.

The question was called and Commissioner Wright, Commissioner Laetz, and Commissioner Roberts voted for Tracy Wright, and Commissioner Cohen and Chair Frost voted for Andy Cohen. Tracy Wright was elected Vice Chair by a vote of 3-2.

ITEM 1.A. PUBLIC COMMENTS

Carmen Shain expressed concern that the homelessness problem was deteriorating and becoming more aggressive. She stated she spoke with Deputy Treinen about what the City and Sheriff's Department were doing about the problem. She stated her husband was uncomfortable with her taking her toddler to events or programs at the Library, which disappointed her since most programs and events for young children take place there. She stated she wants to be more educated.

Marni Kamins stated she moved to Malibu because she felt safer here. She agreed with Ms. Shain about being uncomfortable taking her young daughter to the library. She discussed frightening interactions with homeless individuals at Bluffs Park. She stated she hoped the Commission would make changes such as no overnight parking, no loitering, and no sleeping in vehicles. She showed photos of a tent encampment she encountered one morning near the library. She expressed fear of using library restrooms due to encounters with mentally ill persons and health concerns.

Adail Gayhart, Malibu Towing, stated his was the official garage and tow for the Sheriff's Department, State Parks, and other agencies in Malibu. He stated his business moved to Oxnard because there was nowhere zoned for it in Malibu. He stated they have only four trucks staged throughout Malibu where there used to be eight. He stated they want to keep Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) open, but responses now required one- to two-hour trips. He stated Sheriffs have to go to the Oxnard facility for investigations. He requested the Commission's assistance in finding a property in Malibu, even if only temporary.

Ryan Embree discussed the City's ordinance that prohibited sleeping in vehicles citywide. He discussed other cities' prohibitions on parking of oversized vehicles. He suggested the City consider implementing a similar ordinance. He questioned whether the City's satellite phones should be utilized better, replaced or upgraded.

ITEM 1.B. COMMISSIONER COMMENTS

In response to Commissioner Cohen, Mr. Gayhart stated they responded to 13 to 14 calls per day, down from about 50 per day previously. In response to Chair Frost, Mr. Gayhart stated they need at least .75 acres. In response to Commissioner Cohen, Mr. Gayhart stated they were down approximately 1,300 law enforcement calls for the year.

In response to Vice Chair Wright, Public Safety Manager Dueñas stated an update on the City's homeless program would be placed on the next agenda.

Chair Frost announced the upcoming Homelessness Taskforce meeting on Thursday, February 14, at 10:00 a.m., in the Multipurpose Room at City Hall.

Deputy Treinen addressed questions regarding how the Sheriff's Department deals with homeless individuals with apparent mental illness. He stated the homeless population is growing countywide.

In response to Ms. Kamins, Public Safety Manager Dueñas discussed why there are more homeless in Malibu than Beverly Hills. She discussed recent court rulings related to homelessness. She explained the impact of the Woolsey Fire on the homeless situation.

In response to Commissioner Laetz, Deputy Treinen confirmed the City's ordinance prohibiting sleeping in vehicles could no longer be enforced due to the Boise v. Idaho decision.

Commissioner Laetz recognized Carol Randall and Marlene Matlow for their stellar work over decades with this Commission. Executive Assistant Linden announced that Carol Randall would be recognized for her service at the February 11, 2019 City Council meeting.

Commissioner Laetz expressed frustration with issues not being added to Commission agendas. He stated the Commissioners, with consensus, should decide what will be on the agenda. He stated he would like to see future discussions on Sheriff's deployment in Malibu, particularly their visibility on PCH. He asked if the Commission participated on the PCH Taskforce. He suggested the Commission seek to have the Metro traffic signal grant for signal synchronization extended beyond Topanga. He stated problems at the Sunset Boulevard, Chautauqua Boulevard, Temescal Canyon Road, and Coastline Drive intersections had a bigger impact on traffic. He stated Caltrans traffic engineering changes, such as the Malibu Beach Inn crosswalk and the median project, should be vetted by this Commission, the Public Works Department or the City Council.

Public Works Director DuBoux discussed how the Public Works Department works with Caltrans on projects.

In response to Commissioner Laetz, Public Works Director DuBoux stated the six new traffic signals at Webb Way and Civic Center Way have LED, not incandescent bulbs. Mr. Laetz stated the Civic Center Way improvements should not be delayed. He stated there should be pedestrian walkways on Civic Center Way. He discussed trucks double-parked on PCH at Point Dume being using as billboards for a rehabilitation facility, and a different rehabilitation facility truck with flashing lights parked at the Chevron station at Webb Way.

Vice Chair Wright stated the eastbound lane on PCH near the egress from Malibu Road seems to be dipping. Public Works Superintendent Aladjadjian stated Caltrans has been notified. She agreed that staff should be directed to clean up encampments and human waste at the Malibu Library and deal with harassment of residents by the homeless.

In response to Vice Chair Wright, Executive Assistant Linden explained how an item could be placed on an agenda for the Commission to discuss and make recommendations to the Council. Public Safety Manager Dueñas stated she would have homelessness subject matter experts come to speak to the specific issues.

Vice Chair Wright inquired about the status of repairs to the stairs at Surfrider Beach. Public Works Superintendent Aladjadjian stated replacement stairs were in the design phase and he would follow up and report back about the timeline.

Commissioner Roberts stated the homelessness issue is magnified here because other beach areas like Santa Monica and Venice are becoming overcrowded. He stated the City should do what it can to assist Malibu Towing or another towing company to be located in Malibu, preferably in central Malibu. He thanked Mr. Gayhart for rescuing him when his vehicle was disabled during the fire.

Commissioner Cohen suggested someone on this Commission contact cell companies to get cell towers and backup generators in Malibu. Commissioner Laetz stated cell companies have decentralized.

Chair Frost requested emergency communications be added to the next agenda.

Chair Frost commended Public Works staff for their work 24/7 during recent storms. He stated personal water tanks on private property should be revisited. He suggested scheduling a joint special meeting with the Public Works Commission regarding water supply and Caltrans projects. He agreed with Commissioner Laetz about the great job Carol Randall did for this Commission and about the lack of visibility of Sheriff's patrol vehicles and motorcycle traffic deputies on PCH. He stated western Malibu needs additional traffic enforcement. He stated the crosswalk near Corral Canyon is not a good idea due to high speeds coming down the hill toward a signal and crosswalk. He agreed with Commissioner Laetz that the crosswalk by the Malibu Beach Inn should have been discussed with the City. He agreed the Wilcox property was a perfect location for Malibu Towing.

1. Approval of Minutes – January 9, 2019

Staff recommendation: Approve minutes of the Public Safety Commission Adjourned Regular meeting of January 9, 2019.

Ryan Embree stated discussion of satellite phones in the minutes was not detailed enough. He requested Public Works Superintendent Aladjadjian's comment at the top of page 7 of the minutes be changed from "were ineffective" to state the phones "did not work."

MOTION Commissioner Laetz moved and Vice Chair Wright seconded a motion to approve the minutes of the Public Safety Commission Adjourned Regular meeting of January 9, 2019, as amended. The motion carried unanimously.

ITEM 3 OLD BUSINESS

None.

ITEM 4 NEW BUSINESS

A. Risk and Vulnerability Maps from the Woolsey Fire

Recommended Action: Receive and file report on the Risk and Vulnerability Maps from the Woolsey Fire.

Assistant Public Works Director DuBoux presented the report. He stated the same presentation was given to the Public Works Commission. He discussed the City Council's authorization to contract an expert to produce the maps.

Chair Frost left the dais at 6:07 p.m.

Public Works Director DuBoux discussed the consultant's previous work on the Thomas Fire. He explained how the maps were created.

Chair Frost returned to the dais at 6:09 p.m.

Public Works Director DuBoux displayed the maps and explained how Public Works staff could use them to better protect at-risk properties. He stated the most recent storm was equivalent to a 10-year storm event.

Commissioner Laetz asked what could be done now in Malibu West. Public Works Director DuBoux stated k-rail and sandbags could help keep mud away from that area but since Malibu West consists of private roads, the City cannot provide that assistance. He stated City staff was advising Malibu West property owners about what they could do.

Chair Frost discussed Los Angeles County Flood Control District (Flood Control District) work to protect Paseo Canyon.

Commissioner Laetz asked if Malibu West homeowners associations (HOA) could cede roads to the City. Public Works Director DuBoux stated it was possible and, if that happened, the City would implement all the protection efforts. In response to Commissioner Laetz, Public Works Director DuBoux stated the HOA would need to approach the City Council.

Commissioner Roberts stated k-rails could be easily rented by the HOA.

Chair Frost stated private roads in Horizon Hills would not meet City standards.

In response to Commissioner Laetz, Public Works Director DuBoux stated Bonsall did well except for the usual flooding at the Arizona crossing. Public Works Superintendent Aladjadjian stated Zuma Creek is on private property between Bonsall and Busch.

In response to Commissioner Laetz, Public Works Director DuBoux confirmed parts of Trancas Creek are included in the Flood Control District. He stated debris basins were being discuss with the Flood Control District for installation above Malibu Park. Public Works Director DuBoux stated he would update the Commission about that at a future meeting.

Commissioner Laetz asked if similar projects could be added in Escondido Canyon, Sycamore Canyon, and Ramirez Canyon. He stated all possible locations citywide should be reviewed with the City Attorney and the Flood Control District. Public Works Director DuBoux stated the County was looking at other locations.

In response to Vice Chair Wright, Public Works Director DuBoux clarified how the City was using information provided by maps.

Commissioner Roberts stated the City is experiencing unusual conditions due to fire damage.

In response to Chair Frost, Public Works Director DuBoux stated the maps were based on current conditions resulting from the fire.

MOTION Commissioner Laetz moved that staff initiate discussions with homeowners groups in Malibu West regarding ceding ownership of private streets to the City in order to protect the taxpaying residents.

Public Works Director DuBoux stated he would talk with Councilmember Pierson.

Commissioner Laetz withdrew the motion.

B. January Storm Preparedness and Response

Recommended Action: Receive and file the January Storm Preparedness and Response Report.

Public Safety Manager Dueñas presented the report. She discussed the preparation for Emergency Operations Center (EOC) staff strategies well in advance of the start of the storms. She stated on-call staff were instructed to be prepared. She discussed activation of the CERT Team to notify and assist residents in preparing their homes. She stated Sheriff's Deputies went door-to-door throughout the most at-risk neighborhoods to be sure residents knew they should be prepared for possible evacuations. She discussed alerts and disaster notifications sent in advance of the evacuations. She stated neighbors near evacuated addresses were approached by CERT Team members who provided explanations of the evacuations. She stated the EOC was activated at Level 3 on Saturday at 6:00 a.m. She stated it remained activated until Friday, including staff answering City Hall phones 24 hours per day.

Commissioner Laetz commended staff for their work. He discussed problems with information provided by Unified Command to the media. Public Safety Manager Dueñas stated the City posted more details on the website and in alerts.

Chair Frost stated the EOC was very impressive. Public Safety Manager Dueñas stated one CERT Team member was stationed in the EOC as a liaison to communicate information from the EOC to CERT Team members in the field.

Commissioner Laetz commended City Manager Feldman, Public Safety Manager Dueñas, and Assistant Public Works Director DuBoux for information provided to him at KBUU. Public Safety Manager Dueñas stated the information was shared with all local media and she was interviewed by multiple stations.

Public Works Director DuBoux discussed Public Works activity in preparation for the storms. He stated they learned where the worst problem areas were from the new maps and the December 2018 storms. He stated over 10,000 sandbags and 500 feet of k-rail were placed throughout the City prior to the storms, with most placed near Encinal Canyon and Malibu Park. He stated staff followed weather news

provided by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA), including regular National Weather Service webinars detailing expected debris flow and flash flooding. He stated the City hired a weather consultant to provide more detailed, updated weather reports with models of where rainfall was expected. He stated the intensity of storms is most critical. He stated the City had four two-man crews working 12-hour shifts, 24 hours per day, with heavy equipment staged in Malibu Park and Encinal Canyon. He stated blade trucks were used to clear canyon roads. He stated the City has an agreement with the County to use blade trucks on County sections of canyon roads. He reported the next storm is forecast for February 14-19, with the most significant rain expected February 17-19.

Chair Frost asked if the City has standby agreements for heavy equipment. Public Works Director DuBoux stated the City has an agreement with its maintenance contractor, Burns Pacific, which has resources to obtain more equipment, as well as with the County for assistance from the Department of Public Works and Fire Department. In response to Chair Frost, Public Works Director DuBoux stated the County will work on private streets. In response to Commissioner Cohen, Public Works Director DuBoux stated there is a cost to the City, but it is worth the cost.

Commissioner Laetz stated the Hesperia Fire Department and California Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) were helping during the past storm.

Public Works Director DuBoux stated Encinal was hit very hard. He stated catch basins are full and will take up to the next storm to get them cleared. He commended Public Works Superintendent Aladjadjian and his team for a great job.

Public Safety Manager Dueñas distributed copies of the NOAA January 31, 2019 Weather Event Review.

Deputy Treinen introduced Lieutenant Seetoo as the City's new Sheriff's Department Liaison. Lieutenant Seetoo stated she was at Incident Command for the recent storm events. She stated they were doing precision evacuations, which was different from Ventura County's evacuations. She stated approximately 300 people were evacuated, but they cannot make addresses public. She stated precision evacuations indicated specific, at-risk properties in certain areas, which were then notified in person by Sheriff's Deputies. She commended the Deputies for doing a tremendous job communicating with affected residents. She explained what they learn from each storm event.

Chair Frost commended the Sheriff's Department for its handling of evacuations during the recent storm event.

C. Public Safety Agency Activity

Recommended Action: Discuss recent Public Safety Agency activities and receive and file monthly activity reports from the County of Los Angeles Sheriff's Department, Fire Department and Lifeguards.

Deputy Treinen discussed changes in crime statistics. He stated traffic collisions were down in all categories, including DUI. He stated he would bring up the need for additional visibility. He discussed a new court-mandated requirement to log all traffic stops at the station, including those without citations. He stated the extra office work took the motor deputies off the road.

Commissioner Laetz asked if the City could buy cellphones for the Deputies to do reporting on the phones. Lieutenant Seetoo stated she did not know if there was a phone app for completing the questionnaire. Commissioner Laetz stated documented cases of profiling have led to the new requirements.

In response to Commissioner Laetz, Deputy Treinen stated the new Malibu Sheriff's substation should improve the amount of time required for reports.

Ryan Embree asked about vehicle versus pedestrian collisions in November and December 2018. He questioned the small number of radar citations issued. He asked if the City received the surcharge from impounds. He suggested the Commission track the number of incidents involving impounds. Lieutenant Seetoo stated she could look into that.

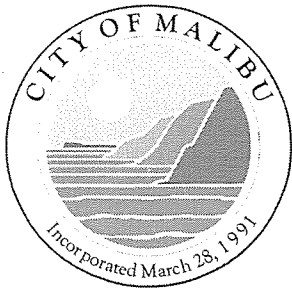



Subject: Services for Homeless Individuals with Mental Illness

RECOMMENDED ACTION: Receive and file a report and presentation on services and strategies that are currently being used to address homeless individuals in Malibu who exhibit aggressive behavior and severe mental illness.

DISCUSSION: At the February 6, 2019 Commission meeting, several residents expressed concern that there has been an increase in the number of aggressive and mentally ill homeless individuals in the Civic Center area and requested assistance in addressing the issue. In response, the Commission asked staff to bring back a report on what is being done.

The City currently has two ways to address aggressive and mentally ill homeless individuals: 1) the Malibu Homeless Outreach Team accompanied by psychiatrist Dr. Wesley Ryan; and 2) the Los Angeles County Mental Evaluation Team (MET Team).

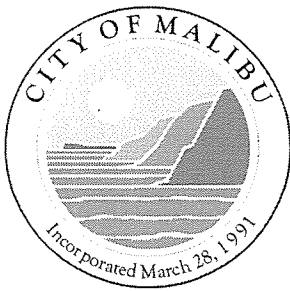
Every Thursday, Dr. Wesley Ryan accompanies the Malibu Homeless Outreach Team to provide diagnosis and treatment services to homeless individuals who suffer from mental illness. Dr. Ryan is board certified in both general and addiction psychiatry, and provides services in evaluation, diagnosis, medication management, psychotherapy, and addiction treatment.

The Los Angeles County MET Teams include a specially trained deputy and clinician from the Los Angeles County Department of Mental Health. They respond to deputies who need help dealing with a mentally ill person. A study by the Virginia-based

Treatment Advocacy Center found mentally ill people are 16 times more likely than others to be fatally shot by police. MET teams are designed to reduce that possibility, and to get mentally ill people into treatment instead of jail. In 2017, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors voted to expand the number of MET teams from 10 to 23.

Dr. Wesley Ryan, along with Alex Gittinger, the Malibu Outreach Team supervisor, and Los Angeles County Sheriff's Lieutenant John Gannon, who oversees the MET program, will attend the meeting to present additional information about these services and respond to questions from the Commission and the public.

Subject: Update on Projects Affecting Traffic on Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) and City Streets and February 2019 Storm Response

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Receive and file status updates on projects affecting traffic on PCH and City streets, including: a) PCH at La Costa Pedestrian Improvements Project; b) Slope Stabilization Project (Caltrans); c) Fiscal Year 2017-18 Street Maintenance Project; d) PCH Median Improvement Project (Caltrans); and e) Caltrans maintenance work; 2) Receive and file update on the City's activity in response to February 2019 storm events; and 3) Provide feedback or questions for Caltrans staff.

DISCUSSION: Below are the latest updates on the status of projects in and around Malibu that affect traffic and public safety on PCH and City streets:

- a) PCH at La Costa Pedestrian Improvements Project – The contractor completed potholing to identify existing underground utilities. Due to underground utilities conflicts with the proposed signal foundation, additional work is needed to relocate an existing water line. Staff has submitted plans to Los Angeles County Water District 29 for plan review and approval to relocate its water facility around the proposed signal foundation. Once the water line has been realigned, the contractor will begin the construction work.
- b) Slope Stabilization Project near Via Escondido (Caltrans) – The project is ongoing with expected completion by Fall 2019. Commuters should be aware that the speed limit is reduced to 30 miles per hour within the work area.
- c) Fiscal Year 2017-18 Street Maintenance Project – In general, the project includes pavement repairs, surface preparation and crack seal/fill, cold milling, asphalt rubber hot mix, slurry seal, pavement striping and signing, and appurtenant work.

The remaining work to be completed is the slurry seal, which will be scheduled as soon as weather conditions allow.

- d) PCH Median Improvement Project (Caltrans) – The project is ongoing for the Median and Road Improvements Project along PCH, between Puerco Canyon Road and 0.2 miles east of Corral Canyon Road. The project completion is expected by June 2019, weather permitting. Night work hours are 10:00 p.m. to 6:00 a.m. Commuters should be aware that the speed limit is reduced to 30 miles per hour.
- e) Caltrans Maintenance Work (PCH within Malibu) – According to Caltrans, highway maintenance crews conducted brush clearance, trash removal, and crack fill within the Malibu city limits.

The Commission may provide staff with a list of questions to be asked during the City's monthly conference call with Caltrans. Responses to those questions will be reported back to the Commission at its next Regular meeting.

Several projects scheduled for work during February were delayed or postponed due to weather.

City Response to February Storm Events

The Public Works Department continuously monitors weather forecasts prior to, during, and after rain events. Based on those weather forecasts provided to the City, specifically the intensity of the storm activity (storm intensities over 0.5 inches per hour are likely to produce debris flow), the Public Works Department makes appropriate preparations for upcoming storm events.

During February 2019, the City experienced two significant storm events:

- February 1-6 Heavy rain and wind, Flash Flood Watch, High Wind Watch
- February 13-14 Heavy rain and wind, Flash Flood Watch

During these storm events, the Public Works Department had four two-man crews working back-to-back 12-hour shifts. Heavy equipment was placed in the Malibu Park neighborhood and on Encinal Canyon Road in order to provide quick response time. These two areas were identified as the most at-risk of mud and debris flow based on what occurred during prior storm events since the Woolsey Fire. Three blade trucks were used during the storm events to remove debris from the public roadways throughout the City.

All storm-related debris is currently being stockpiled and hauled off from the vacant City lot near the southwest corner of Civic Center Way and Webb Way, with approximately 10,000 tons of debris currently being hauled away for disposal. During the storm event on February 1-2, the majority of storm debris was in the Malibu Park neighborhood and

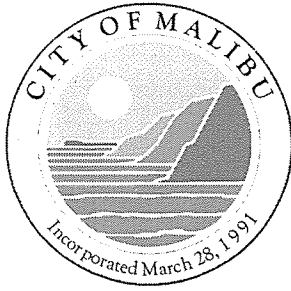
Encinal Canyon Road, with additional debris along Malibu Road and Broad Beach Road. City staff were in Malibu during the storm event with Public Works crews stationed in key locations to keep storm drains open, and to clear and remove debris from the roadway as quickly as possible.

Some of the impacts from these storm events included:

- February 2-4: Road closures due to flooding, mud, rocks and/or debris:
 - Malibu Canyon Road from Seaver Drive to Piuma Road
 - Malibu Road (24000 and 25000 blocks)
 - PCH from Broad Beach Road to Las Posas Road in Ventura County
 - Kanan Dume Road between Cavalleri Road and the 101 Freeway
 - Decker Canyon Road (SR-23) northbound
 - Rainsford Place and Bonsall Drive
 - Cuthbert Road between Busch Drive and Harvester Road
 - Clover Heights at Harvester Road
 - Harvester Road between Clover Heights and Cuthbert Road/Philip Avenue
 - Zuma Beach underpass
- February 14: A tree fell on Cliffside Drive, with utility wires knocked down and blocking the road, and a power outage throughout the neighborhood.
- Numerous closures of Topanga Canyon Boulevard, between PCH and Grand View, were required due to mud and rock slides, as well as Caltrans slope stabilization work after the rain ended. These closures resulted in some minor impacts to traffic flow along PCH through the area near Topanga Canyon, which is maintained by Caltrans.

Public Works staff continues to monitor future storm forecasts and will coordinate field crews and schedules accordingly.

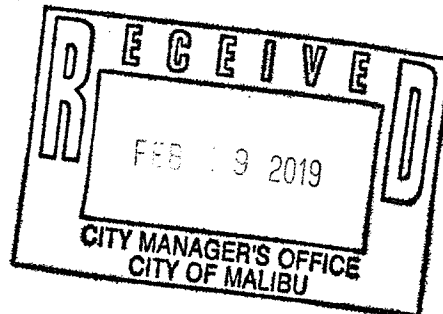



INTERVENTIONS

No interventions were held this month.

COMMUNITY / CRIMINAL ISSUES

1. We conducted a monthly parental resource class at Lost Hills Sheriff's Station. This program was developed by our unit and is designed to educate parents about: 1) The current trends in juvenile behavior and delinquency, 2) Alcohol/narcotic awareness and recognition, 3) School policy and campus issues, 4) Gang awareness and negative peer relations, 5) Parental rights and responsibilities and, 6) Parental responses to incorrigible and/or delinquent behavior. We also address the specific concerns relating to the minor's behavior. We educate the minor and their parents of possible criminal behavior and the legal consequences. We offer suggestions and make recommendations to improve the minor's quality of life.
2. Spoke with numerous citizens and parents who called to question various juvenile concerns and issues in the community. We also provide the parents with various juvenile resource programs within our community.
3. We met with the Sylmar Juvenile Court District Attorney regarding the investigation and filing of criminal charges against juvenile offenders.
4. Met with Acting Captain Jennifer Seetoo throughout the month in order to keep him up to date regarding our unit's investigations and current juvenile issues within our city.
5. Entered juveniles into the Juvenile Automated Index system for various violations.
6. Made court appearances to testify as witnesses on the part of the People of the State of California and attended court proceedings in cases generated from the City of Malibu. We also investigated, prepared, and filed cases with the District Attorney's office. We additionally assisted other investigators in the preparation of cases for court.
7. We met with station narcotic detectives on a regular basis to exchange information regarding juvenile and drug related issues. We have worked with the narcotic detectives on several narcotic cases directly and indirectly involving juveniles.

8. Handled the processing and follow-up of various juvenile referrals brought to the attention of this unit (i.e., Juvenile Information Forms, Field Interview Cards, Juvenile Automated Index, and citations for various juvenile contacts with uniform personnel).
9. Conducted our normal checks of juvenile problem areas in the city during weekend evenings and responded to juvenile related calls for service.
10. Updated the Gang Book and briefed the captain on criminal activity trends
11. Registered 7 sexual predators.
12. Participated in SARB Program.
13. Assisted Human Trafficking with search warrant Re: Minors and Pimps

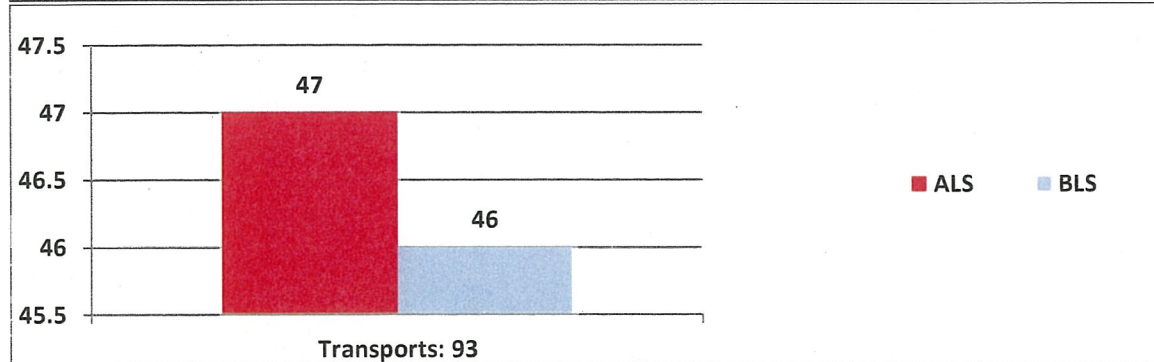
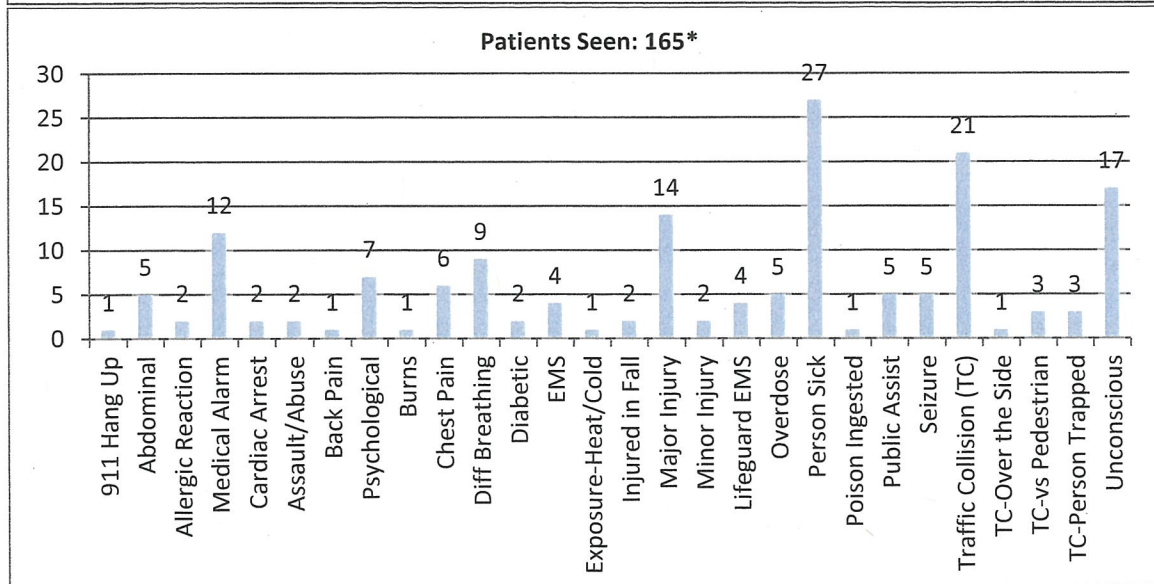
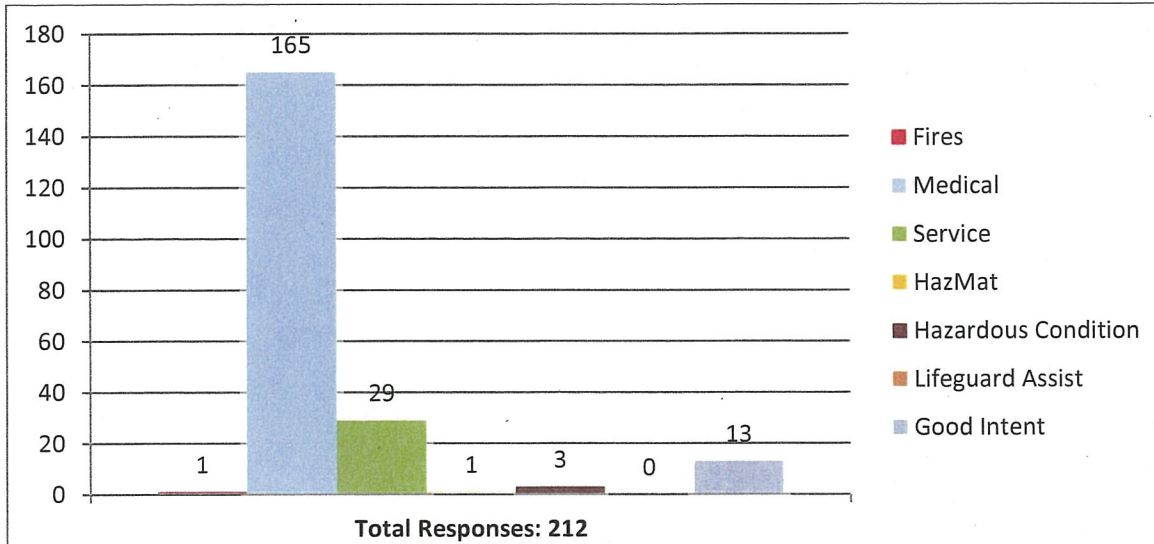
