In this guide, you will find a lot of information on various subjects such as how to borrow books that are not at UF, what books we have recently acquired, the latest news from major French and Francophone newspapers, direct links to the main databases you'll need, digital projects currently being developed, etc.

This link is good to have for any projects you might work on in your various classes. If you are completely lost and don't know where to find resources and sources, the Project Starter Database is a great tool. It links to a few important databases with explanations of what they give you access to. These include General databases, mostly for scholarly articles, Hot Topics databases, and News and Newspapers databases, which are very useful if you are looking for information that was published in the press, either recently or in the past (including the deep past!). Lastly, it links to OneSearch, which searches all of our collections – though you can also access this from the homepage of the library's website. .

II. MLA International Bibliography

One of the features of the research guide is a tab linking to databases that will be very useful for writing your French papers. Among all of these databases is the MLA International Bibliography.

This database provides comprehensive coverage of literary criticism for literature worldwide.

There are many ways for you to customize your search. Do you want a book or a journal article? Are you searching for a keyword, a title, an author? In which language?

Small tip: Search by Subject rather than Keyword for a more precise search. A search by keywords means you are searching all searchable fields such as subject terms, abstract, title, author of publication, and other information.

You can also change the parameters on the page displaying your search results. Do you want to exclude dissertations? Only look at peer-reviewed journal articles? Only look at what has been published the last 10 years? Only search for materials in French? You can decide and modify your search that way.

You can arrange to have the search results displayed by author, relevance, source, or date (newest first for example) and in the "Page Options" you can select to have a detailed view for each entry. Some entries have abstracts which sum up the content of an article or a book.

The great thing about this database is that the option “Find it @UF” helps you locate any and all digital resources in UF’s collection. (Please note: “Find it @UF” only looks for online / digital resources, so for books or journals that only exist in physical format [i.e. non-eBooks and non-online journals], you will have to search the catalog for this item using its title or ISBN/ISSN.)





If UF does not have the item that you're looking for, you can submit an Interlibrary Loan request (see image 4). Once you've done so, you then have three pickup location options for books: Main Campus (Library West), Health Science Center Library, or Legal Information Center. Articles will be delivered to you as a PDF to download.

Once you select your pickup place and login to ILLIAD (The Interlibrary Loan Service), the database will populate the form with all the information needed to request the loan. At that point, all you have to do is send the request. To log in to ILLIAD, you will need your Gator ID number, so have that on hand.



UF is also part of U BORROW, which is a system that allows you to borrow materials directly from other libraries in the state of Florida university system. What that means is that you can borrow books (not journal articles) from any library in Florida that would have them.

If a library in Florida has the book, you will see a sign telling you so when you search for an item in the catalog.



Click on the “UBorrow” sign and you will be redirected to a different page. Once there, click on the “UBorrow” sign again. It will prompt you to login with your GatorLink username and password. After that, just like for ILLIAD, it will ask you where you would like to pick up your item: Main Campus (Library West), Health Science Center Library, or Legal Information Center. Place your request and you are done.
