

Literary Device Challenge

1. Go to <https://literarydevices.net>
2. On this website you will find over 130 different literary devices; you need to select 24 devices for the year. Select 24 devices that you are NOT familiar with while also being something that you want to learn about. In other words, don't select 'character' or 'setting' as these are devices you already know something about.
3. Each week, you will have some workshop time to work on your literary devices.
4. Follow Mrs. Hoy's in-class instructions about how to set up your Literary Device section of your Reader's Notebook—each literary device will be given 3-4 pages with the Literary Device name written at the top of each page.
5. For each Literary Device you select, you will need to include:
 - a. An 'official' definition
 - b. A 'personal' definition by you
6. Three (3) examples of this literary device as **found in any of your current reading** (poems, short stories, class novels, textbooks, magazines, your independent reading, etc.). You are NOT to use direct examples from <https://literarydevices.net> or other example generators. These must be devices that you have found organically through your reading.
 - c. Each example must highlight:
 - a. Example evidence from the text including book title and page number (if possible)
 - b. Explanation of how this literary device enhances the reader's understanding of the author's message
 - c. Explanation of how this literary device helps progress the story and/or message being told
 - d. The presentation of each Literary Device should show engagement in how you are learning about this device.
 - e. You will be turning in your Reader's Notebook once per quarter for evaluation as outlined below.

Suggestion: Create your definition pages first so you know what types of literary devices you should be looking for throughout the year.

Expectations:

- Q1: Definitions completed for all 24 literary devices; minimum of 18 examples
- Q2: Minimum of 36 examples for the existing 24 literary devices
- Q3: Minimum of 54 examples for the existing 24 literary devices
- Q4: All 24 Literary Devices have 3 examples

Challenge: At the end of each quarter, your peers will evaluate the accuracy of your selections and provide you feedback.
