

Lesson 1 - Alliteration lesson

In this lesson the children will practice writing sentences with alliteration to help them with their summer shape poems later in the week.



Mr Johnson has been doing some writing.
Can you spot the pattern?

Hedgehogs hop happily over the hedge.

Cats crawl carefully across the carpet.

We saw a snake slithering silently.



Maybe you noticed that a lot of the words started with the same letter.

This is called **alliteration**.

Hedgehogs **h**op **h**appily over the **h**edge.

Cats **c**rawl **c**arefully across the **c**arpet.

We **s**aw a **s**nake **s**lithering **s**ilently.




Alliteration

The use of the same beginning consonant sound in a line or verse.

Example:

Peter Piper picked a
peck of pickled peppers.




Later this week we are going to be creating summer shape poems.

These can be really effective when alliteration is used.

Lesson 2 - Summer Shape Poems

In this lesson the children will be finding out about shape poems. They will then be creating their own summer shape poems.



This week we are going to be making Summer shape poems!

Can you remember the other style of poem we looked at this year? Look at the picture below for a clue!

That's right, we looked at Acrostic Poems!

An acrostic poem is where each letter from the first word in the sentence spells out a word. Can create a quick one for the word 'sun'?

We have also read poems which have inspired us to write our own.

Do you remember the poem about the noisy animals?



Quack Quack said
the yellow, fluffy

We made our poems even better by including expanded noun phrases.


Do you remember the silly **Would you rather** poem?



We copied the patterns in the poem: repetition and line openers

A shape poem describes an object, person or animal. The words of the poem form the shape of what is being described.

Look at these examples on the next pages and see if you can guess what is being described!



Softly, it falls silently from the sky.

Slowly you slip and slide as you sled
your way through its silky secrets.




They glide across



Shape Poems

1. Each line can be a different length or be curved to form the shape of the object that is being described.
2. Full stops and capital letters are used just like you would use in sentences.
3. The lines don't have to rhyme.
4. Alliteration can be used - this is lots of words in a row beginning with the same letter.
5. Similes can be used - this is where we use the words 'like' or 'as' to compare two things to each other.





Think of something related to Summer, here are some ideas:
