Metaphor Poems About Friendship

Metaphors:

- "When a friend calls to me from the road" Throughout the poem: Represents an opportunity for connection.

- 3. "Your heart as a shrine" In the poem: Symbolizes the sacredness of the bond between friends.

5. "To My Excellent Lucasia, on Our Friendship" by Katherine Philips

Metaphors:

- 1. "Contracted thus" Early in the poem: Suggests a binding, unbreakable agreement between friends.
- 2. "Twinn'd Souls" Throughout the poem: Implies two souls intertwined in friendship.
- 3. "Our Hearts and Minds be one" In the poem: Symbolizes the unity and mutual understanding in friendship.
