1. "The Road Not Taken" by Robert Frost

Metaphors:

Metaphors:

- "But if it had to perish twice" Line 5: Suggests the cyclical nature of destruction and human emotions.

5. "Mirror" by Sylvia Plath

Metaphors:

- "I have no preconceptions" Line 2: Suggests the mirror's impartiality and objectivity.
- "I am not cruel, only truthful" Line 9: The mirror's honesty is emphasized, equating truth with a form of non-malicious cruelty.

6. "The Butterfly" by Pavel Friedmann

Metaphors:

- "The last, the very last" Opening line: The butterfly as a symbol of the fleeting nature of beauty and life.
- "So richly, brightly, dazzlingly yellow" Line 2: Represents the vibrancy of life and beauty in dark times.

• "A little white dot on the wing tip" - Line 3: Symbolizes purity and hope amidst despair.

7. "The Owl and the Pussy-Cat" by Edward Lear

Metaphors:

- "They sailed away, for a year and a day" Line 8: Represents a journey of love and adventure.
- "And hand in hand, on the edge of the sand" Line 28: Symbolizes unity and companionship.
- "Danced by the light of the moon" Final line: Suggests whimsy and the magic of love.

8. "Mother to Son" by Langston Hughes (Different Metaphors)

Metaphors:

- "But all the time I've been a-climbin' on" Line 13: The act of climbing symbolizes perseverance and resilience.
- "Reachin' landin's" Line 15: Symbolizes achieving milestones or overcoming challenges in life.
- "And turnin' corners" Line 16: Represents navigating life's changes and uncertainties.

9. "Daffodils" by William Wordsworth

Metaphors:
